SHORT STORIES BY JESUS by Levine, Amy-Jill

Jesus was a skilled storyteller and perceptive teacher who used images from everyday life to stir up interest in his message about the Kingdom of God. But life in first-century Galilee and Judea was very different from our world today, and many traditional interpretations of Jesus's stories not only ignore this difference, but also often import anti-Jewish and sexist views. In this wise, entertaining, and educational book, Levine explores Jesus's most popular parables, revealing their hidden depths, exposing their misinterpretations, and showing how they can still challenge and provoke us two thousand years later.

FEASTING ON THE WORD, CHILDREN'S SERMONS by Wehrheim, Carol A.

Practical suggestions for preparing and delivering the children's sermon. After explaining the purpose of the children's sermon, noted Christian educator Carol Wehrheim provides a story for each Sunday of the church year based on the Revised Common Lectionary. In addition, a few stories are provided for special moments in the church's life, such as when a mission group is commissioned, church leaders ordained, and a death occurs. This resource provides pastors and other church leaders with fresh, engaging stories that children will understand.

SIMPLY GOOD NEWS by Wright, N.T.

Noted Bible scholar N.T. Wright shows us how Christians today have lost sight of what the "good news" of the gospel really is. In Simply Good News, he takes us back in time to reveal how the people of the first-century—the gospel's original audience—would have received Jesus' message. He offers a clear and thoughtful analysis of what the "good news" really is, and applies it to our lives today, revealing its power to transform us.

ACCIDENTAL SAINTS: FINDING GOD IN ALL THE WRONG PEOPLE by Bolz-Weber, Nadia

Tattooed, angry and profane, this former standup comic turned pastor stubbornly, sometimes hilariously, resists the God she feels called to serve. But God keeps showing up in the least likely of people—a church-loving agnostic, a drag queen, a felonious Bishop and a gun-toting member of the NRA. In a time when many have rightly become dis-illusioned with Christianity, Accidental Saints demonstrates what happens when ordinary people share bread and wine, struggle with scripture together, and tell each other the truth about their real lives. This unforgettable account of their faltering steps toward wholeness will ring true for believer and skeptic alike.

SPIRITUAL COMPANIONING by Reed, Angela H., Osmer

Among the smiling faces in church on Sunday mornings are those who long for deeper, more genuine relationships within their local congregations--active, intentional relationships that nurture the soul and encourage personal encounters with God. Drawing on decades of experience in spiritual direction, congregational ministry, and seminary teaching, this book offers a clear and rich introduction to the theology and practice of spiritual companioning in the Protestant tradition. The authors explore the topic in a biblically based and historically informed manner and give practical help for cultivating spiritual relationships in congregations and beyond, using stories throughout to illustrate key ideas. Discussion questions are included.

ENVISIONING THE CONGREGATION PRACTICING THE GOSPEL by Stewart, John W.

Reflecting a wealth of ministerial experience, this accessible and instructive book is designed to equip lay leaders and pastors of Protestant churches to better envision and practice gospel-driven ministry amid the challenges of our twenty-first-century context. Especially addressing Baby Boomer and Gen X leaders, seasoned pastor and practical theologian John Stewart presents and explains five biblically mandated, foundational practices for being and nurturing the church: belonging, discipling, witnessing, serving, and worshiping. Stewart believes that these five practices are "essential markers" for congregations that seek to remain faithful to their risen Lord, and he offers memorable examples of how specific churches are carrying them out well.

The Madonna Program

Parma Greece UCC has been presenting the Madonna Program, a unique, biennial holiday production since the church celebrated its 175th year anniversary six years ago. The focus of the hour-long event is the presentation of eight live tableaus replicating in precise detail eight classic portrayals of the Madonna and Child.

In each tableau, a painted backdrop duplicates the background of the original painting, and the live model representing Mary, is dressed in a custom-made costume (almost) identical to that in the original masterpiece. As she sits absolutely still within a life-size gilded frame, special lighting effects produce the highlights and shadows created by the artist. The result in the totally darkened room is a breathtaking illusion, a living replica of a beautiful and inspirational work of art.



As each work is presented, a narrator shares information about the painting and the artist who created it. Besides the tableaus, the evening includes musical interludes, both choral and instrumental, and the recitation of poetry and scripture verses celebrating the Madonna. Light refreshments follow the production.



The church is planning for the December 2016 production and is seeking volunteers to help with this labor intensive project. They are looking for very dedicated volunteers to assist with all aspects of this event - production coordinator, director, young ladies to sit as Madonnas, seamstresses, artists, behind the scenes assistance, manual labor, electrical, audio, visual, research, writing/editing, public speaking, singing, instrumentals, decorating for the reception, baking cookies, etc.

A lot of the work occurs for months before the event, but the last week is very intense. All positions would have experienced people working with them for guidance, but the small congregation needs others to join them to make this a success next year.

The church views this program as a prelude to the holiday season, and the congregation offers this as their Christmas gift to the community. Not Terrorists; Not Tourists: Refugees are Human Beings

The leadership of the United Church of Christ and the Disciples of Christ released a joint statement Nov. 17, "Not Terrorists; Not Tourists: Refugees are Human Beings," speaking out against the current comments from many politicians — including the governors of 24 states who say they will not accept Syrian refugees for resettlement — along with members of Congress and U.S. mayors, who want the Obama administration to rethink the refugee policy, which will admit 10,000 Syrians in 2016. The Syrian war is the worst humanitarian crisis of our generation, and it has no resolution in sight. More than half the Syrian population has been forcibly displaced from their homes, and more than four million Syrians are now refugees in neighboring Middle Eastern countries and Europe. Over half of Syrian refugees are children.



Recognizing the enormity of the Syrian crisis, our churches around the nation have prayed, extended care, and

advocated for allowing more refugees from Syria—and in fact more refugees and potential immigrants generally—to be welcomed. In seeking such a welcome, we assert our faith commitments to "love the sojourner" (Deuteronomy 10:19) and to treat "the foreigner residing among you…as your native-born" (Leviticus 19:34). We likewise continue to advocate for negotiated steps to end the root cause of the Syrian and Middle Eastern refugee crisis—the Syrian war. We stand firmly behind those positions.

It is tragic that our country continues to witness the scapegoating and systematic collective punishment that it has known in the past. During World War II, those of Japanese heritage were interned. In former eras it was Catholics, Jews, and repeatedly Asians who were refused entry or inclusion into our immigrant nation. Today we watch still as a new manifestation of Jim Crow leads to the mass incarceration of great numbers of African-Americans. We have experienced how fear and suspicion lead to institutionalized discrimination and systematic dehumanization of whole communities.

We are appalled by the punitive and discriminatory rhetoric and actions by many political leaders to restrict and deny the admission of Syrian refugees because they are Syrian, or because they are Muslim. Such restrictions and limitations only make the displaced Syrian population doubly victimized: victims of the violence of war, and victims of the violence of hatred and bigotry.

We aspire to something greater than this. We celebrate the human community. We recognize evil in the world, but the answer is not to shut out whole populations collectively. We are called to be a merciful and caring community; to seek justice and to honor every person; and to stand up and shout out when such a vision is challenged or violated. We urge caution and caring in our discourse and in our actions, so that we all may hold ourselves to a higher standard and ideal.
