#### **UCC Churches Walk Their Talk**

"Phoenix Rising" will be the theme for this year's GVA United Church of Christ entry in the annual Rochester Pride Parade on Saturday, July 16. Volunteers from several UCC churches met on June 21 to begin planning for this year's parade. Ideas brainstormed at the meeting including use of the Maya Angelou poem "Still I Rise," mythical themes including ancient religions, and the idea of Christ being like a Phoenix and rising/resurrecting.



A "We Will Rise" logo will be accompanied by six people using fabric "wings to dance/fly through a church-like structure and throughout the parade as Phoenix birds. Marchers will carry the church structure, signage, and church signs, wearing UCC T-

shirts and white pants or shorts and bird-like masks, feathers or boas if possible.

Three people have volunteered to fly through the parade and three more are needed. These volunteers will be dancing/flying holding fabric wings for the entire parade route. Volunteers may wear whatever clothing/ dress/costume they like as long as it is either red, orange and/or yellow, and are responsible for their own headdress. 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

Rochester's interfaith community mourns along with families, neighbors, and relatives of the victims in Orlando and with the LGBT people around the world. We, the Rochester Interfaith Community, together are grieved, shocked and shattered over the mass shooting in Orlando. It is a bone-chilling and despicable act, and we condemn it wholeheartedly. We are Jewish, Muslim, Christian, Sikh, Buddhist and Hindu, and we believe such acts are against the moral teaching of every religion.

There can be no justification for such ruthless acts against innocents. We stand together with LGBT people here and around the world, sharing their grief and pain, and send out our heart-felt condolences. Our thoughts and prayers are with the families of those killed; we pray for swift recovery of those injured, and for their relatives.

After the attacks of September 11, 2001, we as interfaith leaders of Rochester took a pledge of remembrance and peace. In order to respect one another and to stay in peace, we agreed to pray for peace in our world and community; to give space for disagreement on challenging issues; to remember the promises of relationships that can endure

through turmoil and grief; to remember that our acts can heal or divide; to encourage a climate of openness; to remember we are all children of God; and to remember that hope requires action to be fulfilled.

We reiterate our commitment to these principles, to each other, and to you. We are neighbors in this contiguous Rochester village; we have different faiths, cultures, ethnicities, races, colors, and sexual orientations. Sadly, in our village we will also meet people who may be mentally sick, angry at the world, or even radically or religiously fanatical – people who feel that violence is somehow justified.

We will not stand for that violence, we will not stand for hateful individuals committing violence invoking the name of our innocent neighbors, and we will not stand for violence against our neighbors. We urge all political and religious leaders, teachers and educators, print, electronic and social media in our country and around the world to be mindful and not incite hatred that pits one group against another. Let us engage each other with respect, let us stand for peace, let us stand for justice, and let us stand together. Salaam, Shanti, Shalom, Peace!

#### Henrietta UCC Celebrates 200 Years



The story of Henrietta UCC goes back to 1811, when the Pittsford Presbyterian Church took up a missions offering to "preach the gospel to the heathen." Only \$10 was collected, so they gave the money to their pastor with the instructions to "preach the gospel to the indigent people of Westtown (now Henrietta). The church was established May 20, 1816.

Some might say we're still indigent heathen, but we celebrated 200 years of surviving and thriving on Pentecost Sunday (May 15), with the theme of "Rich History, Promising Future."

#### GVA Honors Salem Nutrition Center Cooks at GRCC's Annual Faith in Action Dinner

The United Church of Christ Genesee Valley Association's honorees this year are Lois Metzger, Ruth Howard, and Vonnie Dohr. These three women have contributed a total of 58 years volunteering for the Salem Nutrition Center, an outreach mission of Salem United Church of Christ that serves people who are hungry. Lois and Ruth coordinate and cook the Monday meals, and Vonnie cooks up three different



soups each Tuesday. Salem Nutrition Center serves 15,000 meals a year.

the Fairport Public Library over 18 years ago. In her words "I accepted and the experience continues to be a wonderful blessing for me."

Yvonne Dohr: Yvonne, commonly known as




Vonnie, is a member of St. Theodore's Catholic Church. She has volunteered at the Salem Nutrition Center for 16 years making those delicious soups and she

# Bridge Project in West Virginia

The United Church of Christ is among the partners in the "Bridge Project" of the West Virginia VOAD (Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster), whose members collaborate on disaster recovery efforts.

Residents in the region's hill and valley environment rely on hundreds of small private bridges to safely cross the many creeks that thread through the communities. The bridges are their lifeline to work, school, the doctor's office, grocery store, and emergency services.

Last spring's severe flooding damaged or destroyed 1,000 homes as well as washing out 3,000 "private access" bridges – forcing people to take inconvenient detours at best or to risk dangerous crossings at worst.

This region is marked by high poverty, unemployment and environmental degradation following the collapse of the mining industry, so few residents can afford to build more than a make-shift bridge on their property.



Reflections on our Violent World from Rev. Dave Inglis and Rev. Martha Koenig Stone
We have all been affected by Sunday morning's mass shooting in Orlando. Both of us attended the clergy retreat that preceded the NY Conference Annual Meeting. The leader, Rev. Donna Schaper, talked about the discouragement she often feels as she looks at the political and social landscape with all of its conflicts and overwhelming problems. She said that when she feels like all her efforts are futile, she realizes that she has allowed her sphere of concern to overshadow her sphere of influence.

Her sphere of concern is vast, because she wants everyone everywhere to live in a world where God's peace, love and justice reign. And because we are all interconnected, she feels distressed and diminished when people suffer violence, injustice, rejection, poverty, and pain.

But she reminds herself that God hasn't called her to change the whole world. God has given her a sphere of influence—a small portion of this world—and her calling is to invest her time, energy and gifts to her part of the world, and do what she can to help this part reflect God's reign. So she begins each day by prayerfully pondering what the most important things are that she can do that day to touch the people and situations that are within her sphere of influence.

So, our beloved brothers and sisters in Christ, let us all hold all the people who have been impacted by this terrible tragedy in our prayers. They are all within our sphere of concern. We can give them over to God, and pray that God will inspire those who are in their sphere of influence to do what they can to bring compassion, healing, hope, and peace. At the same time, let us renew our commitment to bring compassion, healing, hope, and peace to the part of the world that is within our sphere of influence. Because we are all interconnected, we know that our positive actions will ripple out into the world.
